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General information about practical exams

Centres must follow the guidance on science practical exams given in the Cambridge Handbook.

Safety

Supervisors must follow national and local regulations relating to safety and first aid.

Only those procedures described in the question paper should be attempted.

Supervisors must inform candidates that materials and apparatus used in the exam should be treated with caution. Suitable eye protection should be used where necessary.

Hazard data sheets relating to substances used in this exam should be available from your chemical supplier.

Before the exam

- The packets containing the question papers must **not** be opened before the exam.
- It is assumed that standard school laboratory facilities, as indicated in the *Guide to Planning Practical Science*, will be available.
- Spare materials and apparatus for the tasks set must be available for candidates, if required.

During the exam

- It must be made clear to candidates at the start of the exam that they may request spare materials and apparatus for the tasks set.
- Where specified, the supervisor must perform the experiments and record the results as instructed.
 This must be done out of sight of the candidates, using the same materials and apparatus as the candidates.
- Any assistance provided to candidates must be recorded in the supervisor's report.
- If any materials or apparatus need to be replaced, for example, in the event of breakage or loss, this must be recorded in the supervisor's report.

After the exam

- The supervisor must complete a report for each practical session held and each laboratory used.
- Each packet of scripts returned to Cambridge International must contain the following items:
 - the scripts of the candidates specified on the bar code label provided
 - the supervisor's results relevant to these candidates
 - the supervisor's reports relevant to these candidates
 - seating plans for each practical session, referring to each candidate by candidate number
 - the attendance register.

Specific information for this practical exam

During the exam, the supervisor (NOT the invigilator) must do all the experiments and record the results on a spare copy of the question paper, clearly labelled 'supervisor's results'.

If chemicals are prepared in more than one batch, clearly labelled supervisor's results must be provided for each batch. The candidates using each batch must be listed on the supervisor's report.

- $1 \times \text{thermometer} (-10 \,^{\circ}\text{C to } +110 \,^{\circ}\text{C}, \text{ at } 1 \,^{\circ}\text{C})$
- $1 \times heat\text{-proof mat}$
- 1 × Bunsen burner
- 1 × boiling tube*
- 8 × test-tube*
- 1 × test-tube rack
- 1 × test-tube holder
- 1 × wash bottle of distilled water
- 1 × pen suitable for labelling glassware

paper towels

red and blue litmus papers

aluminium foil for testing nitrate/nitrite

wooden splints

the apparatus normally used in the centre for use with limewater in testing for carbon dioxide

*Candidates are expected to rinse and reuse test-tubes and boiling tubes where possible. Additional tubes should be available.

Materials

The materials listed in the table must be provided to each candidate.

FA 2 [MH]	120 cm ³	1.0 mol dm ⁻³ sulfuric acid	See preparation instructions in the current syllabus.
FA 3	150 cm³	10 vol hydrogen peroxide	Dilute 100 cm ³ of 100 vol hydrogen peroxide [C] to 1 dm ³ with distilled water. The solution can deteriorate so it should be prepared as near as possible to when it is required, or kept refrigerated.
FA 5 [MH]	29	powdered manganese(IV) oxide	Provide approximately 2g of MnO_2 [MH] in a stoppered container.
FA 6	10 cm³	0.2 moldm ⁻³ ammonium iron(II) sulfate	Dissolve 78.4g of (NH ₄) ₂ Fe(SO ₄) ₂ •6H ₂ O [MH] in each dm ³ of solution.
FA 7	15 cm³	0.2 moldm ⁻³ potassium iodide	Dissolve $33.2g$ of KI in each dm 3 of solution.
FA 8	15cm³	0.5 moldm ⁻³ hydrochloric acid	Dilute $250\mathrm{cm^3}$ of $2.0\mathrm{moldm^{-3}}$ HC l to $1\mathrm{dm^3}$ with distilled water. See preparation instructions in the current syllabus for $2.0\mathrm{moldm^{-3}}$ HC l .
sodium carbonate [MH]	2g	anhydrous sodium carbonate	Provide approximately 2g of $\mathrm{Na_2CO_3}$ [MH] in a stoppered container.
distilled water	300 cm³	distilled water
